# Oct.1962-Oct.1963. WOMEN OF THE CHURCH: HISTORY:

The Women of Bayside Presbyterian Church have had a gratifying and rewarding year. During the year there has been a wonderful demonstration of our Women's theme, "Unity in Christ" in action. Our Women have served in community work, Church work in all its phases, and their individual responsibility in carrying on the work of the Kingdom here on earth. Mrs. Wm. Graham, Jr. was our able president.

Twelve wemen have been placed in our five Circles. The three day-time and two night-time Circles have a total membership of 118 at the present time. Average Circle attendance for the day-time Circles was 11; for the night Circles 10.

The sum of \$1,181.34 was contributed to the General Fund./
From the Circle Funds:

Love gifts to missionaries and others \$ 95.00 Meals for Millions - - - - - 37.13 Building Fund - - - - - 67.13 Scholarship Fund, up to - - - - 100.00 To Heart Fund, in memory of Helen Ney 7.50

The Circle Fellowship has extended its service in many ways during the past year; work with the International Students, sending them cards on special occasions, boxes of snacks and home-baked cookies each month, and attending graduation of one student by special invitation;

Visitation with shut-ins and retired ministers and remembering them with cards, flowers and gifts on special occasions; and

Assisting at the Navy "Y" on the first Sunday afternoon, every other month.

Other activities of the Circles include a Visitation Program, Prayer Group once a week, Cancer-dressing Day once a month, serving at Family-night Suppers, providing additional help in the nursery, sponsoring a Girl Scout Troop, serving at Blood Bank, and sending cancelled stamps to the residents of Sunnyside Home, and cards to each resident throughout the year.

Method of Bible Study and results have been excellent with more and more Women taking part in discussion and programs including the Intensive Bible Study "Hammer on the Rock."

Ten of our Women attended the Annual Presbyterial meeting held at the First Presbyterian Church in Portsmouth.

On World Community Day, the 2nd of November, the Women of our Church were hostesses.

Sixteen of our ladies attended the World Day of Prayer at Virginia Beach Presbyterian Church this Spring.

May Fellowship Day at Charity Methodist Church was attended by 13 of our Women; 15 attended the District Conference and Officers Training Classes held at Christ Church in Aragona.

During the year, our first honorary Life Membership Pin was presented to our first President, our beloved Mrs. Helen Ney who lived to enjoy wearing it only a few months.

The Women and the Church furnished another room at Massanetta this year, adjoining one furnished by one of our Women, Mrs. Eitty Davenport, in memory of her husband.

Our President, Mrs. Clenn Graham, was given the honor of turning the first shovel at our new building site.

Our Vice-President, Mrs. Parrett, presented many interesting and varied programs during the year, at our General Meetings.

Our World Mission Chairman, Mrs. Hanson, working through operation"Handelssp" directed by her husband, has continued to make tremendous contributions to the needy overseas:

Sept. 1962 - three large cartons of clothing packed and sent to

Project Handelasp, for shipment overseas:

Oct. 1962 - four boxes of werm clothing were given to Navy dependents execuated from Guba to Horfolk, and all clothing left over from this collection given to Project Handelasp for shipment overseas.

Nov. 1982 - Asked for more warm clothing and blankets, and names

of any Church members overseas:

Dec. 1962 - Packed and shipped 15 boxes of clothing, blankets

and toys, for the relief of needy overseas:

Jan. 1963 - Planned week of Prayer and Self Denial services for Feb. 25th through March 1st; ordered Circle study books and materials on World Missions for the Sunday School; also ordered Guides and Envelopes for special offering in February; packed and sent five boxes of clothing and toys to Project Handelasp for overseas shipment to needy areas;

Feb. 1965 - Requested that each Woman bring soap to the February

General Meeting, for Project Handelasp.

At the February General Meeting, Comdr. Hanson gave an excellent and inspiring talk on Project Handelasp, for our World Mission Emphasis program.

Permission was granted by the Session to have February 25th as "Soap Day" to collect soap through the Sunday School; and 3 boxes of clathing were donated to Handelasp this month.

March, 1963 - Delivered 3 large cartons of clothing,

l large carton of toys,

1 large box of dress patterns, and 4 large cartons of soap, to Project

Handelasp to be sent overseas to needy areas.

April 1963 - 2 large cartoons of clothing and 1 small box of soap and Sunday-School materials

were donated the 1st of April; also

6 large cartons of clothing, toys and dress patterns, the 2nd of April, after notice in the Sunday Bulletin;

May 1963 - Made appeal for light weight clothing and school supplies, and sent to Project Handelasp, the middle of the month,

4 large cartons of clothing, and 6 more cartons, the last of the months

June 1963 - 4 large cartons of clothing, toys, school supplies, Sunday-School supplies and sewing articles, were given to Project Handclasp. The need for soap was stressed again:

Project Handclasp. The need for soap was stressed again;
July 1963 - 15 large cartons of heavy winter clothing, sewing articles, soap, school books, toys, Bible School supplies and Sunday

School supplies were collected for Project Handelasp;

August 1963 - Scap Drive, through the Circles, for the needy people of South America; and 9 cartons of clothing were also donated to Project Handclasp, for needy ones.

We are very proud of this marvelous report of our World Mission

Chairman, Mrs. Hop Hanson.

Our Women, as Friends of the Seminary, sent an offering of \$60.00 from 55 Friends, to be used at Union Theological Seminary.

Our Christian Education Chairman's report speaks for itself:

"CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT ANNUAL 1963

In October - Collected names and addresses and birth dates of all students away at college. Birthday cards were sent to all. Christmas and Easter cards were sent to those who could not be home for the holidays;

November - Christian observance of Thanksgiving and attendance

at worship service Thanksgiving morning was stressed;

December - Through Merwyn, received names of International students at Union Theological Seminary and gave two names to each Circle for "adoption" for the year, with the suggestion that cards, gifts, homemade goodies etc. be sent periodically throughout the year; and stressed the use of good religious books as Christmas gifts, and a Christian observance of Christmas:

January - Stressed need of our work in the community as Christians, and need of Christians to lead our government. Thus, necessity for all

to vote in all elections;

February - Stressed use of Day By Day by all women, and use of

Presbyterian Survey by all members of the family:

March - Discussed possibility of having International Student Sunday, with Dr. Johnson. Plans were made to have it next year, churchwide, with Students from the Seminary speaking at morning worship service;

April - Took Scholarship Fund started last year by W.O.C. to the

Session. It was approved and made church-wide:

May - Had "Going to College Handbook" ordered for students, and gave them out to all Sophmores, Juniors and Seniors in our Sunday Achool;

June - Helped teach in Vacation Church School.

July - Stressed Christian Citizenship and responsibility of all Christians in the community.

August - Served on Christian Education Committee of the Church.

Attended all meetings.

September - Stressed Rally Day, and importance of all adults taking part in the new CLC program of the Church. Total Scholarship Fund as of board meeting was \$58.10, and after General Meeting it was \$100.00.

This past year has been one of pure delight as your Christian Education Chairman of the Women of the Church. I have received much more than I have given, and sincerely feel that the International Students, the Johnson children, the cooperation of the Session, Dr. Johnson and the Representatives in the Circles have all been an inspiration beyond all original hopes. I am truly grateful for having had the opportunity to serve the W.O.C. as

We were kept busy through Annuities and Relief, remembering our retired ministers, shut-ins; and residents of Sunnyside Presbyterian Home, to whom we sent a large box of cancelled stamps. Cards went to each resident on special occasions. Our Joy Gift offering was \$160.30.

Through our White Cross Quota we made three (3) night gowns, the material donated and the gowns made by three of our members.

The Cancer Society, which met in the homes of Mrs. Boyce and Mrs. Clyde Young, with Mrs. Armstrong as Chairman, have made a tremendous contribution to the community:

Our Stewardship Chairman, Mrs. Motyca, attended The Leader-ship Conference in South Norfolk, in the Spring of 1962; planned Stewardship Program for October 1962, General Meeting, which was a drama taken from Presbyterian Survey of September 1962; distributed literature from the Board of Woman's Work; stressed reading of books on Stewardship in our library and articles in the Survey; and helped plan the program at May Meeting.

Mrs. Warren, our representative to the Princess Anne Council of Church Women, attended two Council meetings.

Bayside extended the invitation to the Council to have The World Community Day Meeting at our Church. Our Women did an excellent job of preparing and serving a light lunch, on this occasion.

We were well represented by 15 ladies on Friday, March 1st, World Day of Prayer, at the First Presbyterian Church, Virginia Beach.

We were also well represented on May 3rd, May Fellowship Day, at Charity Community Church. Our representative had a part on the program. Our Annual donation for a book for the religious shelf of the Virginia Beach Library, was taken to this meeting.

At the Annual Business Meeting, one of our own members, Mrs. L. Dow Ledbetter, was elected Fresident of the Council.

Mrs. Lineken, our Librarian, reports that many books have been used by Circle members and others, for reading and reference. Some new books have been added, and we are looking forward to a better space and additional book cases in our new Church.

Church Extension Chairman, Mrs. Hamerick, has encouraged each family to participate in the Week of Prayer and Self-denial. Literature and offering envelopes were given each family. The study book "Your Neighbor as Yourself" will be reviewed and passed to each Circle.

We have had one film strip shown. All women were urged to be alert to those who were without church homes, and to encourage them to show a friendly interest to all new people; to give new names and addresses to our pastor. The methods used by our Church have been: Visitation, Fellowship and Prayer.

All Circles were asked to pray for missionaries as they appear in "Day by Day"; and our Women were reminded not to forget their shut-ins, especially the aged and sick, sending cards, small gifts

and their prayers.

Clothing was collected and sent to the migrant workers, and several boxes were sent to Mrs. Bear's Cupboard, during the year.

We were happy to have a part in giving a needy young girl a coat, shirt, sweater, slip, and a game, at Christmas time, 1962. She was taken to luncheon at Schwartz, which was a real treat to her.
