Mrs. Engle spoke at one of the suppers on "Our Birthday Objective", and we were all informed about the conditions in the Appalachia region, and are more aware of the importance of giving to this worthy objective. A visitation Committee was set up with a chairman and many calls were made. The Nursery program was revised and we now have one of the ladies teaching the children during the church hour - after attending the preliminaries and the Children's Moment in the sanctuary.

All circles purchased and are using Barkley and the Layman's Bible commentary in preparation for the Bible Study by the Circle Moderators.

Leaflets and books on Stewardship have been ordered and offered so that they may be used by Circle Members.

Each Circle is asked to be a prayer group, particularly when meeting together and individually each Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock as they go about their daily tasks.

A Christmas retreat was held December 7, at 10:00 a.m. for the Women of the Church.

Our family night supper was December 5, at 6:00 p.m. to emphasize the Advent Season by having each family make an advent wreath, using the scripture and devotional as each candle is lighted, beginning the fourth Sunday before Christmas Day.

A program was given to help interpret the season of Christian witness at home and abroad, by a speaker, a film and exhibits from overseas and from our mission fields.

World Day Of Prayer was observed with five of our women attending.

The leaflet "The Call to Repentance and Expectancy" was distributed and the congregation was asked to study these for personal commitment and outreach. "The prayer calendar" and "The Call to Self Examination and Commitment" were also given members to use in their personal devotions and used at Council meetings.

The Women of the Church Birthday Observance was well attended and the offering was \$109.15.

Each one was reminded to continue their personal meditations and that stewardship continues through the summer months - each person a good steward.

Christian Community Action Chairman Report

The activities and services of our women as listed will relate some of the activities promoted by "Christian Community Action".

Every other month on a Sunday, we served at the Navy YMCA - baking cakes and serving coffee and cake to our boys in the service.

Gift wrapping for the servicemen during December at the YMCA.

During the months of October, November, December and January, our monthly emphasis was stressed and carried out with the help of the entire congregation.

The Blood Donor Program has started in our church. Information on blood type and willingness to donate is being placed in a register for use when needed by any member of our church or community.

Contacts were made with neighboring colleges, inquiring about foreign students and the possibility of inviting these young people to our church and homes.

In November, we helped promote "Home's" Sunday by visiting our shut-ins and visiting in the convalescing homes in the area.

We adopted two orphan boys at the Lynchburg Presbyterial Home - with plans during the month of December to send cards, gifts and clothes to meet their needs. Sunnyside Presbyterian Home is being supported by saving of stamps, greeting cards and materials.

Many projects were accomplished during December.

Planned Ministerial Relief through the Circles and entire church. Promotion of the "Joy Cift" planned with help of Session. Special children's program with cooperation of entire Sunday School staff. Visitation program sponsored by Junior Department. Visiting Lynnhaven Home, singing carols and taking gifts.

Gifts and clothing were collected and distributed to the Eastern State Hospital and the Municipal Hospital. This committee has tried to familiarize the congregation with the problems in our community and the need of Christian witness.

Such problems as delinquency among our youth. Volunteer workers for different organizations, such as the Red Cross, Mentally Retarded Foundation and others. The importance of voting and taking an active part in community affairs.

Contacts were made with college students and servicemen with a view to being aware of educational facilities and the need of higher educational standards. All of these things have been emphasized by our committee.

Letters of appreciation were received from the Lynchburg Presbyterian Home thanking the women for the many gifts and money sent the two boys. Many cards and letters were sent to the boys from each Circle during the year.

In April 1966, "Operation Easter Bonnet and Easter Basket for Eastern State Hospital took place. The Circles contribute six Easter baskets, 19 hats, and small money donations for loose candy.

A request was made in April from the Florence Crittendon Home for new fabric - for the making of maternity tops - a total of eight yards of material, thread, zippers and buttons were sent.

The Navy YMCA volunteer cake and service committees continued every other month through October 1966. An average of 10 or 12 cakes were taken and two or three volunteers went to serve. This service was greatly appreciated by the servicemen and the directors of the YMCA.

The Birthday Objective for 1966 was for the poverty stricken area in Eastern Kentucky, and especially emphasized during the months of April and May. The May Fellowship Day

program helped the women to act more effectively on this objective. Mrs. Engle, wife of the Rev. Engle of Lafayette Fresbyterian Church was guest speaker. She showed film strips and gave us first-hand information about the great need in this area of our country.

Many community projects were also accomplished during the year.

Collection of clothing, newspapers and magazines were made weekly from the members of the church and turned over to the Union Mission.

Volunteer drivers from our church were enrolled to take cancer patients to and from various hospitals.

On several occasions disaster struck in our community. Fires occurred leaving families without shelter, food or clothing. Many members of our congregation along with others in the community collected hundreds of pounds of clothing, over 25 boxes of food and \$2,000.00 in cash. This was a real community service performed by all.

In social service - visitation to shut-ins and to send cards to them was stressed through the Circles with great response. Magazines and different articles were taken to the juvenile home in the area.

The World Literacy Program - "each one teach one" was emphasized, material given out and posters displayed. Stemming from this, some of our women helped with "The Headstart" program during the summer months.

Each Circle was encouraged to undertake some social service action during the year. Our women work daily with other christians in their community to bring about needed community reforms.

The district conference and other training sessions were attended throughout the year by the CCAC. The CCAC has tried to cooperate with our minister and members of the Session throughout the year and serve in any way needed.

It was a wonderful year and we give thanks to God for the privilege of serving.

Ecumenical Missions and Relations Chairman Report

In October, blankets and warm clothing was collected for Korea and sent to Church World Service. A poster was placed in the church telling of this need.

We were represented at the meeting of Princess Anne Council of Churches. Two missionaries were chosen by the WOC. They were: Miss Helen Tannehill, Mexico, and Rev. and Mrs. John Folta, Korea.

We were given information about World Community Day held at Good Shepherd Church November 5.

Our Circles turned in "sewing kits". This was attended by several members from our church. The December 2 workshop at Bow Creek Presbyterian Church was attended by representatives from our church.

Christmas greetings were sent to our two missionaries, chosen by the WOC. Christmas packages were sent to International Students at Union Theological Seminary.

In January, a request was made for warm clothing and material for refugees in Korea. One hundred and twenty-five pounds were collected and sent to Church World Service for distribution.

Nine of our ladies attended the World Day of Prayer, February 25, at St. Marks Church.

A large box of clothing was sent in March to the Missionary Closet in Richmond.

We had seven to join the Friendship Circle. We hope to increase this membership as the women become more aware of this worthwhile undertaking.

Easter boxes were sent to our International Students. These boxes were packed by the Sunday School class of Glen Graham and Vivian Carbaugh. Thank you cards were received from the students.

Our Birthday Objective party was held on May 17, with 38 attending.

May Fellowship Day was held May 6, at First Baptist Church, Virginia Beach. Eleven of our women attended.

We were able to send three boxes of good used clothing to the Missionary Closet in May, and again in July, four boxes and two coats.

Nine boxes of clothing were packed for Handclasp, also, soap and Sunday School materials. Working for Handclasp was discontinued during the summer months but will start again in October.

Our White Cross quota for 1966:

12 wrapper pads 2 mattress covers (which were donated by Mrs. May Allen)

For the American Cancer Society with Clydie and Carrie Young as co-chairmen, the following were made:
