Pandemic Fatigue




On Friday the 13th of March, our lives were upended. COVID-19 required that we all pause, quarantine, and do our part to prevent the spread of a virus. When this first started there was a sense that we are all in this

together, and we will all get through this together. Of course when it started most of us thought it would only last a few weeks, maybe a few months, but the virus and the issues that surround it have persisted.

Here we are 7 months later and many of us are exhausted. I read an article recently that discussed the pandemic fatigue that is sweeping the country. People want to get back to the way things were. We long for human connection and social distancing and masks get in our way. I get it, because I am one of those who would like to see a world without masks. I want to be able to reach out and shake a hand or embrace another with a warm hug. However, doing those things now is not wise. The science is clear that wearing masks, washing hands frequently, and social distancing help slow the spread of viruses. It is also clear that we can carry COVID-19 asymptotically. I don't want to get sick and I certainly do not want to unknowingly infect someone else with a virus that can be deadly. Many of the precautions we are following at Bayside are because of state guidelines. We are currently in Phase 3 which still limits the occupancy of physical spaces by requiring social distancing and encourages telework whenever possible. Under this phase when in-person meetings occur they should be as short as possible and limit the number of attendees and follow social distancing practices.

I know that eventually we will get back to doing things in more familiar ways, but I do not know when that will be. Several leading experts including Dr. Anthony Fauci believe we will see a large increase in the number of cases in the coming months. Right now, 33 of the 50 states are seeing increases. Please take care of yourself and others you encounter. In fact, it is what Christ



compels us to do. When Jesus was asked what the greatest commandment was his response was, to "love the Lord your God with your heart, soul, and mind, and the second is like it to love your neighbor as yourself." We are showing our love of God and our love of neighbor by taking the necessary precautions. May we all continue to celebrate God's love in tangible ways.



Session Highlights

Shared joys and concerns and opened the meeting with prayer

- Cherokee Adams led us in a devotional
- 5 of the incoming elders shared their faith journeys as they were examined by the session
- Received an update on the 2020 Vision Implementation; we have currently raised a little over \$400,000 with an initial goal of \$450,000. This does not include the new organ, new grand piano, and upgraded audio visual equipment which has all been fully funded
- Had an initial discussion about the worship survey, followed by discussing our worship and ways to improve it and the best ways to provide worship in the near future. Bayside will continue to livestream even when we are all back together in a more familiar fashion. We are currently looking into better platforms to stream to because Facebook is limited, and they are beginning to change some of their policies. In the future we will probably begin streaming to our web page and our YouTube channel. We will communicate those changes when/if they take place.
- Out of an abundance of caution and recognizing that COVID-19 cases are beginning to increase in many places, the session has made the decision that only essential groups (A.A., counseling, the election, and the Red Cross Blood Drive) will be able to meet in the building until sometime in the Spring. We are closely monitoring the situation and if things improve greatly will re-visit this decision.

Stirring the Soul: Creating Community through Music

One of my previous ministries was serving the Touring Choir at Princeton Theological Seminary. The touring choir visits different churches on Sundays. If the church was far away, it was not possible to visit the church and look at the worship spaces in advance. It was exciting to visit each church, look at the different worship spaces, and decide what the choir could deliver through song during the service. Each visit piqued my curiosity. How can our choir create community in each worship space? Here are three ways the Touring Choir created community in worship. We also create community at Bayside, and this is how we do it.

Finding spaces for singing. Singing is extending in metaphor how hymns, song composers and text writers proclaim the message of God. Even when we already know the melody and can hum the song, it is difficult to sing without “encouragement.” How do we get the right tool for encouragement that helps enliven the service? One summer I attended a workshop on children’s choirs. One of the suggestions from the instructor was to put a brave singer beside a shy one. What a great concept for our congregational songs! Moving the choir down to sit in the pews has enormously improved our own congregational singing. When the hymn is unfamiliar, the choir helps the congregation by singing from the front. Putting the choir in different corners of the sanctuary is helpful, too. One Easter Sunday, the choir sang in two groups facing each other, one group located on the balcony and the other in the front of the sanctuary. This arrangement engaged all the senses with voices surrounding the congregation. It reflected the image of “Christ is risen.” Sometimes the choir can actually surround the congregation when singing a familiar hymn or sing while recessing for some special occasions. Singing is everywhere in the Bible. Paul encourages us “Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly; teach and admonish one another in all wisdom; and with gratitude in your hearts, sing psalms, hymns and spiritual songs to God.” (Colossians 3:16)

Finding the space for listening. Right outside of my church office is the atrium—40 feet long and 30 feet tall. It allows for echoes from God. Preschoolers and church children sing, talk, and play there. It has also become a good place to listen to

the drum circles, instruments playing, and vocal singing on Sundays. I have also found the atrium to be a great place for inviting people to enter the service with music, to hear the handbell choir, the children’s choir, the adult choir, or instruments. We have played an invocation in the atrium as parishioners enter the sanctuary. Finding a space for listening has become a big challenge today. How do we find better spaces to listen? Is the floor carpet helpful or not when receiving sound in our holy space? If we are to welcome the joyful noise from younger worshipers during the service, then we should also consider embracing other human sounds such as shoes walking on a hard surface.

Providing spaces for visual communication in worship: Modern technology has provided us with the ability to learn in many formats including visual, auditory and kinesthetic. How can we use and provide various spaces that take into consideration different styles of learners in our congregation? Can we consider different styles of worship using multiple kinds of equipment for the service?

We need to be sensitive to what we do, why we do it, and how we do it. When we take time to give thought to our worship preparations, God will give us the ability to see and use the special gifts of different individuals, the ability to identify the different needs for different people in the congregation, and different needs for different services. Sometimes adding printed words and the refrain of a musical score in the bulletin under legal license or putting words on a large screen are helpful to members of the congregation. Each church has its own traditions and specialties, but traditions and specialties can be enhanced by using a screen, making important announcements, using Christian art images, and appropriately communicating the purpose of these elements during the worship service.

Creating a hospitable space for community means creating space for all ages—children, adults, remembering those who cannot hear or see well. Sometimes clapping or spiritual movement helps children. Having the adult choir or children’s choir sing in more than one place helps enliven our worship, too. A special way to create community at the end of a service is to move the choir members into each aisle to sing during the closing hymn and create “surround sound” with the music.

God welcomes all. At Bayside, our facilities for worship welcome not only our own church congregation but also first time visitors. May the love of God continue to be shared in our worship spaces.



A Note from the Treasurers Office

From Your Treasurer – “It Takes A Village”

One of the first things Pam and Ed Spillman learned in taking over as Co-Treasurers was the sheer volume of workload in the treasurer’s office. That is why they are dedicating this column to thanking everyone who works in the treasurer’s office. Bayside Presbyterian Church is lucky to have three incredible volunteer assistants – Luanne Wong, Mary Hubbard, and Rita Dunning.

Luanne and Pam essentially swapped places – now Luanne does the church deposit, which involves posting and depositing the donations received in the collection plate and in the mail. This is a weekly job to post the accounts and take the deposit to the bank. In addition, Luanne posts the growing quantity of online donations – so far this year, that equates to 383 transactions. It is Luanne who makes sure our wonderful congregant’s annual giving statements are up to date and accurate! And (as former Treasurer) Luanne remains an invaluable source of information regarding how things are done in the treasurer’s office – and is always ready to pitch-hit in other treasurer-areas when needed.

Mary Hubbard (who also manages Bayside’s fantastic website) posts the online tuition payments made from parents to Bayside’s Preschool. The volume of this task so far this year is 280 transactions. It is Mary that makes sure payments for tuition and camps are posted correctly. Mary has been helping in this way for several years.

Rita Dunning is our newest volunteer, and she is taking over bill paying. Rita pays bills for standards like electricity, gas, water, sewage, trash, lawn service, pest control, and insurance – and also makes payments for childcare (for the nursery, MOPS, First Fridays, etc.), preschool purchases, office supplies and equipment, and a host of other items. We pay many bills by cutting an actual physical check – there have been 375 checks issued at Bayside so far this year. Rita also pays our bills electronically through our bank – of which there have been 261 bill payments made so far this year.

Pam and Ed are very grateful to be blessed with such wonderful help. They could not do the job without them – so here’s a BIG THANKS to Luanne, Mary, and Rita!!



Your Stewardship Ministry is busy working on the church’s operating budget for **2021**. It started with getting the “Asking Budgets” from all the Ministries, then we match that with projected income and, trim where necessary to have a reasonably balanced budget. Over 75% of our income comes from pledges (Pledge Cards) received from the congregation. Therefore, the amount of pledges received drives our programs. So far we have received pledges of \$346,614, which is wonderful. However, we need to get to a level similar to that which was pledged in 2020 – about \$565,000. We have a ways to go. So, if you have not turned in your Pledge Card, please bring it by or mail it to the church as soon as possible. If you need a card – contact us and we will get one to you. Thank you!

Updates on our budgeted “pledge” collections for **2020** church operations– we are at 88% of expected contributions to date as of the end of September. That compares to 90% at the end of August and 82% this time last year. Our thanks to you all for meeting your pledges. On the downside, we are still at 79% overall – being dragged down a bit by the lack of some collections we normally receive when the church is open (loose cash during services and tenant donations are being adversely affected). So, keep up



the great spirit of giving.









We have covered administration, property and treasury (various programs providing general support and structure to the church for all to utilize). Now we continue to delve into the various nuts and bolts of the specific programs operated within the church. This discussion will be Worship.

“Worship Ministry coordinates and prepares our services of worship so that we as a congregation can seek to know and do the will of God through faithful participation in meaningful worship. We seek to nurture worshippers and encourage spiritual growth through the power of the Scripture, preaching and teaching and

celebration of the sacraments of Baptism and the Lord's Supper.”

Worship's budget is broken down in many categories. It can be consolidated into some basic overall themes. First – providing music for worship (with some spill over support to other music program opportunities). The budget line categories of: Music Literature; Workshops/Memberships/Licensing; Substitute Organist; Music/Pulpit Honoraria; Section Leaders; Keyboard Instrument Maintenance; Praise Team Drummer; and Special Music Programs (total of \$27,200). Various supplies: Usher/Cleaning; Communion; Supplies/Equipment; and, Children's Choir supplies make up \$2,300. Seasonal décor is budgeted at \$400 and audio/visual is another \$250. The last budget item is Continuing Education for the Music Director - \$1,500.

That wraps up the look behind the curtain. Thanks for your attention. I hope it has provided some insights into the expenditures of BPC.

WORSHIP

In Person Worship has returned!

Sunday Mornings at 10:00 am in the Fellowship Hall

Yes! We have returned to in person worship! However, due to Covid-19, and the restrictions we need to follow, worship will look a bit different.

Congregating before or after worship— Arrive 10 minutes before service begins. As much as we all would like to catch up with one another, please do not congregate within the building.

Worship will be **uploaded** onto YouTube, **later in the day**, once worship is completed.
