President's Report

Your Presdient is most grateful to have been called to serve a Christian purpose this past year. The women of Bayside were blessed with many opportunities to serve their church, their community, and, yes, even the world.

Cur circle newsletter was born this year to let women both active and inactive know what was going on, and it proved to be very successful. Many of our ladies worked in the two nurseries, and a third class was started called the "Little Church" for younger school children where they could learn how to attend worship service. Several women took advantage of the training sessions offered at Massanetta and District workshops. Once again a Christmas bruch was held for our college students during the holidays. Early morning services were conducted during Holy Week. Among other service opportunities, food was prepared to be taken weekly to the home of one of our ill members. Another was driven several times a week to the convalescent home. Over one-hundred dollars was collected for a person in need; and whenever unfortunate circumstances arose in the various homes, our women responded gladly.

The ladies started the practice of saving coupons for Crossnore School, made hospital gowns for Eastern State, and contributed to the Chaplain fund. As usual, our White Cross quota was
met, cancer dressings were made, old eye glasses collected,
children at the Presbyterian Home were remembered, shut-ins were
visited, several members were "Friends of the Seminary", and
papers were collected for Union Mission.

Bayside was well represented at the World Community Day Service, The World Day of Prayer, and May Fellowship Day. Some members joined the Least coin of fellowship effort. Others gave box after box of clothing to both the Missionary Closet and Handclasp, besides giving generously to others in need as the occasion arose. A newspaper subscription and Covenant Life Curriculum books in Spanish were sent to our missionary in Mexico.

One of the highlights of the year was the Missionary supper when each circle decorated its own table to represent a foreign country and prepared foods from recipes of that country. Some ladies even dressed in native costumes. The Youth Fellowship presented a play for entertainment. Another highlight was the Birthday Party and Supper when the hospitality chairman and committee prepared the chow mein dinner and decorated the tables with a Japanese setting since our offering went to that country.

Songs were sung, games were played, and a good time was had by everyone.

All in all, I believe the women have grown both in spirit and faith by studying, praying, and working together in Christian fellowship; and I am thankful to have been a part of it.

Your President served on the Pulpit Committee and helped secure a new minister. Along with several other ladies she served on both reception committees for the retiring and the incoming ministers. God's blessings have been many at Bayside this year, and it is my fervent prayer that it will remain so in the future.

World Community Day, November 4, 1966, was attended by several women of the church. Doris Harper was our special representative. Kits from each circle were donated. These kits included soap, soap dish, toothbrush in holder, toothpaste, comb, fingernail file or clipper, face towel, hand towel and plastic drinking cup.

Advent Tryst was distributed to the Women of the Church to be used as a guide into a more meaningful observance of the Christmas Season.

Christmas Greetings were sent to Helen Tannerhill, missionary chosen by our women.

"Week of Prayer for Christian Unity", a pamphlet, was distributed to our women for study during Week of Prayer, January 18th thru January 25th.

World Day of Prayer was observed February 17th at Virginia Beach Methodist Church. The speaker was Mary Council Crane, wife of the Thalia Presbyterian Church minister. Several of the women of our church attended.

Clothing was sent to Mrs. Barre's closet in Richmond in early December.

The White Gross Quota consisting of 1 muslin sheet (108"x72") and four operating room sheets (46"x46") was delivered on March 19, 1967. Cost of this material was \$5.85.

Again in May we distributed used clothing. This time we sent about eight boxes to Mrs. Barre's closet in Richmond.

We celebrated May Birthday Dinner at church on May 16, 1967, at 7:00 p.m. Sixty-five ladies and two guests attended. This year our Birthday offering, amounting to \$139.25 was sent to Kinjo University and Shikoku Christian College. Seven ladies attended May Fellowship Day, held at Baylake Methodist Church.

Leadership and Resources Chairman Report October, 1966 - September, 1967

In October we reported 12 women who became Friends of the Seminary. (Total monies: \$16.00.)

At our November General Meeting we were fortunate to have as our speaker Mrs. Sidney Crane (Mary Council Crane) who spoke to us about Christmas and what we have to cope with during the hustle and bustle, etc.

December brought our college students home, and the W.O.C. sponsored a bruch for them. Approximately eleven of them turned out. A better turnout than the previous year, and they enjoyed getting together.

January started a new year, and your nominating committee was hard at work trying to find the most able women to serve for the coming term. After a few meetings and much consultation, a list of names was submitted, without titles or offices, to the Session. When the list was approved, your committee started its work in earnest, visiting the women and asking them to

serve. This is one of the most rewarding aspects of our office since we meet and talk with women, those who are ready to serve the Lord and those who are a little reluctant but ready to try. At the General Meeting in April the slate of officers was presented.

Also at the General Meeting in April our speaker, Mr. Lawrence Cruser, Asst. Probation Officer for the City of Virginia Beach, spoke to us of ways in which to help the youth in our community and told us many things that we were not aware of. Mr. Cruser is also a member of Bayside.

In June one woman attended the Massanetta Training Conference, and we had seven to go in August.

September found us organizing a local training school (first time) for our officers; and even though a hurricane was brewing on the day it was scheduled, we still had a good turnout.

At the September General Meeting the Massanetta Delegates planned a "Question and Answer Panel on Massanetta" (a "What?", and "Why?" sort of affair with something of a reminiscing nostalgia). It ran a bit into overtime, but it was different and enjoyable. With this last function, my year in office ended.

Personal Faith and Family Life Chairman Report October, 1967 - December, 1967

As Chairman of Personal Faith and Family Life I appointed the following committee to aid and advise me: Martha Boyce, Mary Hutcheson, Rhoda Butler, Wanda Smith, and Lucille Ferguson. The committee has met only once, but all have been called on to help or have been consulted with as needed.

A Prayer Group has been established and meets weekly with the Pastor in his study; six members attend with regularity, and several others come when they can.

The main work of the Committee is being promoted through "Think on These Things", a collection of poems, prose, scripture and information intended to spiritually undergird the work and interests of the church each month. These, through the Circles, go into each home. None was "published", however, in January because of the nearness of the Christmas season. Through this we have promoted the use of "Day by Day" and Family Worship, Stewardship, Reading the "Survey", World-Wide Bible Reading at Christmastime, giving good books at Christmas, the Joy Gift, attendance at Prayer Group, and suggested neighborhood prayer groups.

We prepared and distributed a Daily Prayer list for members of the Women's Council, uring the use of this in praying daily for a specific member of the Council. We urged Circle Chairmen to do the same for their Circles. Some have.
